First Quatrain (lines 1-4): a b a b Second Quatrain (lines 5-8): c d c d Third Quatrain (lines 9-12): e f e f Couplet (lines 13-14): g g

In the three quatrains the poet establishes a theme or problem and then resolves it in the final two lines, called the couplet.

Sonnet 141

In faith I do not love thee with mine eyes,

For they in thee a thousand errors note;

But 'tis my heart that loves what they despise,

Who, in despite of view, is pleased to dote.

Nor are mine ears with thy tongue's tune delighted;

Nor tender feeling, to base touches prone,

Nor taste, nor smell, desire to be invited

To any sensual feast with thee alone:

But my five wits nor my five senses can

Dissuade one foolish heart from serving thee,

Who leaves unswayed the likeness of a man,

Thy proud heart's slave and vassal wretch to be:

Only my plague thus far I count my gain,

That she that makes me sin awards me pain.

Notes:

Five wits = 5 senses Vassal: A subordinate or dependent.

What do we notice about this poem?

- Goes through all of the senses to figure out <u>why</u> he loves her, as he doesn't fully understand.
- He finds nothing, and thus concludes its something inside him that forces him to love her.
